
Sebring 1962: Bruce McLaren has a unique distinction at Sebring. He won 3 different types of races here overall. First, the 1959 Formula 1 USGP held at Sebring in December, driving a Cooper Climax. The 2nd win was in the 3-hour support race in 1962, driving a Fiat Abarth 1000 Bialbero. The 3rd win was the 1967 12 Hours of Sebring with Mario Andretti in a Ford Mk IV. Today, we're going to focus on the lesser known 1962 3-hour support race. McLaren would actually drive in both races at Sebring in 1962, finishing 5th overall in the 12 Hours, driving with Roger Penske, in a Cooper Maserati T61.

The 1962 win in the 3-hour, under 1000cc, race wasn't easy for McLaren. First off, it had rained before the start and the track was very wet. He also had some stiff competition. Stirling Moss was driving an Austin-Healey Sprite and Moss was one of the best in wet conditions. There were several other notables entered as well, including McLaren's teammate Walt Hansgen, Pedro Rodriguez, Innes Ireland, Olivier Gendebien, and Steve McQueen.


Stirling Moss would lead for most of the race. His superior handling in wet conditions paid off until the track started drying out and, with 30 minutes to go, McLaren and Hansgen were both able to get by Moss. That's how it would end up for the top 3 overall spots: McLaren, Hansgen, and Moss. Steve McQueen did well enough and finished 9th overall.


